"Stereo Views"

Stereo view photos from late 19th century, with handwritten labels added in the 1940s

- "Main St., Thompsonville, Conn"
 - 3 stores, bldg. 3sq ft. dated in stone 1872
 - Parsons store building, still standing 6/1978
 - Thompsonville Hotel
 - One right is B.F. Lord"
- "Jos. Burts blacksmith shop, later Carl Miller's (H. Brainard 1947) – M.G. Davis"
- 2 photos, white picket fence lined dirt road. Two men on left, 1 girl right. Taken at ground level or on a hill. No label.
- "Pleasant St. looking north – Dr. Darling house on left. House with pillars Robert Hilditch's father's house, formerly house of John L. Houston's mother. As per H. Brainard in 1947"
- "Holly Brainard thinks this house may be the Robert King house, Enfield St. Also Robert King house in 1947 owned by Kellar"
- "First Presbyterian Church corner No. Main and Church St. The little building on corner town well or pump, thinks Holly Brainard (1947). Built 1841. Greek (?) church in this place before 1966. M.G. Davis"
- "Albert Willis Allen house on Prospect St. opposite the Morrison house"
- "Dry Goods Store run by Mr. Finley. House appliance in 1946. After Mr. Finley was Jane Simpson before ____? James Doig, as per H. Brainard 1947" (note: sign on building 'Parsons, Paints, Oils & Hardware'. Other sign 'Dry, Fancy Goods')
- "Lower end of Pearl St. Building at top of picture John O'Hear's grocery store. St. Patrick's Church in that place now. First – Dixon's board house. Next Savage boarding house. Where St. Patrick's now stands was Adams and O'Hear's store (H. Brainard 1947). M.G. Davis"
- "Hotel, Lapp tailor shop. T.T. Co. now occupied by Andy's [unintelligible]. Think G.W. Mosely was dry goods. Holly Brainard says Ed King had undertaking parlor over Mosely store." (note: at least 5 signs between two front buildings: J.M. Lapp merchant, Thompsonville Trust

Co./Thompsonville Savings Bank, G.W. Mosely drugs and medicine, dentist, name unclear, and Miss. S.A. Alcorn Notions and Fancy Goods.)

- "Main St. A.T. Lord Hdw. Bldg. ____ side where T'Ville Hdw Co. is. Benton's Drug Store. Steele _____. Stockinet mill tower. In distance Hartford Carpet Co. M.G. Davis"
- N.P. Palmer, Thompsonville, no notes on back. Man standing in partially demolished building.
- "Lower Pearl St. showing fire department 1st house. Dixon's boarding house. Central St. in between the two buildings. M.G. Davis."
- "Main St. Hunter's store. Think Union Market operated by Benj. Bright on corner. M.G. Davis." (signs in photo include: John Hunter, News Office, School Books and Stationary, Union Market. Other signs too small to read)
- "White Mill where bus station now is (1947)"
- "North Church, Enfield St., later Catholic Apostolic. Torn down in 1929."
- "Episcopal Church, Prospect St."
- "Niles Pease, after that Leete's and now Taber's, 1946. Sign that says Bakery now Sullivan's. Holly Brainard says Niles Pease store first, then Allen and Leete. Leete site was formerly occupied by Parsons cabinet maker. (1947) M.G. Davis"
- "Old jail on Asnuntuck St., Morrison house on hill. Former name of Asnuntuck St. was Park St. according to Holly Brainard in 1947."
- "Former High School building in 1946, police officers and visiting home association. Across street back of trees First Presbyterian Church."
- "Lower Main St. T'ville Hotel on right. M.G. Davis"
- "United Presbyterian Church, corner Pleasant and School St. Sold to Carpet Co. in 1901. M.G. Davis."
- Large house, many people on yard, widow's walk. Printed by Wilcox and Wade, Stafford Springs, CT.
- "Woodruff House on North Main St. where Estelle Bldg. now is (1947). On this site was the Lyman Upson house. The front part of the home was moved to School St. [unreadable] Weising House. Back part of the house in Lincoln St. Was occupied by the Loving family. Polite people run it in 1947 and the Lincoln St. branch of the library is south of it. M.G. Davis"

Stereo views: A series of stereo view cards of famous scenes around the world, c. 1900-1914. None are of Enfield.
